How can you find the best home for your sailboat?

Some boats are anchored in safe bays, moored along private docks or set between pilings. The majority of boats, however, live in marinas. Choosing the best marina for your boat depends on your particular requirements. A boat owner that plans on living full time on the boat will have different needs and requirements than an owner that is simply looking for a place to store the boat.

Whether you're looking for a long-term home for you and your boat or in the process of finding a seasonal berth for safe keeping, this checklist will help you ask a variety of helpful questions.

The objectives of using this checklist are as follows:

- To consider your requirements for you and your boat
- To determine what you need to know to make an informed decision when comparing a variety of marinas
- To research the information most relevant to your situation so to find the best marina for your needs/requirements

Instructions: Review the 'Marina Selection Criteria Table' and determine what information is relevant for your particular needs. Cross off any items that don't apply to your situation. For example, if you're looking for a marina to store the boat rather than use it as a weekend vacation home, you might be more interested in cost, security systems and proximity to your current residence. If, however, you plan on using the boat as a vacation home, you might be interested in marina facilities, local restaurants and weekend noise levels.

Once you've decided what criteria is relevant, copy and print your list in preparation for your fact-finding mission. Using the Internet, email and phone gather as much information as possible. And if possible, visit the marina you intend on using. During your visit, use the accompanying 'Questions to ask tenants' checklist.

Can you use offsite contractors? Is	
there a fee associated to doing so?	
Does the marina have a store	
selling boat parts, spares, etc.? If	
not, where's the closest boat	
store?	
Ease of entering and exiting the	
marina? (Do you have to go	
through a canal lock to get in/out?	
Does the tide create difficulties	
with boat handling?)	
Restrictions of entering an exiting	
the marina (can you only	
exit/enter on high tide? Does	
marina have a gate that closes at a	
certain time?)

Are the staff available to help with	
arrival and departure	
proceedings? If yes, what hours	
are they available? VHF number?	
Is there ample protection from	
swells, storms and adverse	
weather?	
Is the marina in a hurricane or	
typhoon area?	
What is the marina's policy on	
hurricanes/typhoons– must you	
move your boat if a	
hurricane/typhoon is coming?	
If a hurricane/typhoon does hit	
the marina, what are the chances	
that the marina will survive it?	
If there's a tidal surge how high	
can the marina go without floating	
away?	
What is the security like? Are the	
pontoons locked? Is there a night	
watchman?	
Does the marina have a hull out	
facility? What are the restrictions	
(weight, width, height)?

Marina Selection Criteria Table (5 out of 6)

What is the proximity to	
anchorages, other marina's, day-	
trip spots with the boat, etc.	
What is the proximity to local	
restaurants, bars, etc.?	
What is the look and feel of the	
area?	
Does the marina have points of	
interest near by (grocery store,	
parks, attractions)?	
If living aboard	
Are live aboards are welcome?	
(Just because a marina permits	
live aboards doesn't mean that	
marina staff like them)	
Are other live-aboards present?	
Is there a community or a social	
setting for live aboards?	
What is hull growth like? For	
example, is growth on the hull a	
major problem? Is a hull cleaning	
mandatory after a month?	
Noises? Is the marina under a	
flight path? Do tankers or loud	
party boats go by? Is there a boat	
yard that has constant noise	
nearby?	

Marina Selection Criteria Table (6 out of 6)

Smells? Is the marina near a water	
treatment plant, boggy area or	
down wind of industry?	
Volcanoes? Is there an active	
volcano nearby? (If yes, when the	
ash in the air lands on the boat and	
then gets wet it turns into an acid).

While walking around the marina...questions to ask tenants:

Instructions: If you have the opportunity to visit the marina you intend on choosing, walk the docks and find tenants that have similar requirements that you have. For example, if you're planning on living full time on the boat, find a full time live aboard to talk to. If you don't have the ability to visit the marina, ask the marina staff for a few tenant email address so you can send some of these questions to them.

- How long have you been a tenant? (Try to find someone that will be using the marina in a similar fashion as you and your family: live aboard/weekend use/ weekend apartment/just for docking).
- □ What's it like to ______ (live, visit during weekends, etc.) in this marina?
- □ Are the marina staff members quick to solve problems or respond to issues?
- □ Is there a sense of community amongst other tenants?
- Do other tenants look out for each other and keep and eye on things?
- □ Has there been any crime in the marina? How's the security?
- □ Is there a difference in noise levels, traffic, etc. on the weekends versus the weekdays?
- □ Have there been any 'disasters' (tide surge, fire, boat crash, etc.) and how did the marina handle it?
- Are boats substantially affected by external boat wakes, wind or any other outside influence?

- □ What's the worst thing you've found about being a tenant in this marina?
- □ What's the best thing about being a tenant in this marina?
- □ Would you recommend this marina to others?
- □ Anything else that's important to you (does the WIFI really work? Are pets welcomed? Are wheelbarrows abundantly available or do you have to spend an hour hunting one down? etc.)
